A rural community decided to treat its opioid problem like a natural disaster

Details the efforts of Washington's Snohomish County to address the opioid epidemic. This rural county is the first in the country to respond to the crisis like a natural disaster, inspired by their experience with responding to the 2014 landslide in Oso, Washington.

Desperate for hurricane relief, rural communities help each other

The orders came down to rural residents as the menace of Hurricane Michael approached in the Gulf of Mexico: Get out. Get out now. Following Hurricane Michael, residents of devastated rural communities in Florida are helping each other survive while awaiting official aid. "Thank God for the community," says Alford, Fla., resident Lillian Chance. You think the government would have come out to help us country folk but we are still struggling." At White City First Baptist Church in Gulf County, volunteers prepared enough food to feed 800 people hot meals, along with nonperishable items, water, and toiletries.

Community-based palliative care: scaling access for rural populations

The benefits of palliative care are described as "the heart of healthcare." Experts and advocates share the importance of scaling this care to rural outpatients with serious illness and chronic medical conditions.

Child & Parent Online Study

Similarly to how kids learn about dental hygiene, early intervention and prevention can help promote proactive coping for handling strong emotions. Researchers at the Kansas City Center for Anxiety Treatment, P.A. (KCCAT) and Virtually Better, Inc. are examining ways of delivering family education and self-help tools for improving abilities to respond to common worries, fears, and other emotional health features in childhood, possibly reducing later needs of professionally delivered therapies.
