WHAT IS A SENIOR CENTER?

Recognized by the Older Americans Act (OAA) as a community focal point, senior centers have become one of the most widely used services among America's older adults. Today, nearly 11,000 senior centers serve 1 million older adults every day.

PARTICIPANTS

- Approximately 70% of senior center participants are women; half of them live alone.
- The majority are Caucasian, followed by African Americans, Hispanics, and Asians respectively.
- Compared with their peers, senior center participants have higher levels of health, social interaction, and life satisfaction and lower levels of income.
- The average age of participants is 75.
- 75% of participants visit their center 1 to 3 times per week. They spend an average of 3.3 hours per visit.

IMPACT

Research shows that older adults who participate in senior center programs can learn to manage and delay the onset of chronic disease and experience measurable improvements in their physical, social, spiritual, emotional, mental, and economic well-being. Today's senior centers are reinventing themselves to meet the needs and desires of the aging baby boom generation. Boomers now constitute more than two-thirds of the 50+ population. Senior centers are developing new programs and opportunities for this dynamic generation of older adults.

SERVICES

Senior centers serve as a gateway to the nation's aging network—connecting older adults to vital community services that can help them stay healthy and independent. More than 60% of senior centers are designated focal points for delivery of OAA services—allowing older adults to access multiple services in one place. Senior centers offer a wide variety of programs and services, including:

- Meal and nutrition programs
- Information and assistance
- Health, fitness, and wellness programs
- Transportation services
- Public benefits counseling
- Employment assistance
- Volunteer and civic engagement opportunities
- Social and recreational activities
- Educational and arts programs
- Intergenerational programs

To maintain operations, senior centers must leverage resources from a variety of sources. These include federal, state, and local governments; special events; public and private grants; businesses; bequests; participant contributions; in-kind donations; and volunteer hours. Most centers rely on 3 to 8 different funding sources.

A fter working in education for 10 years, it's evident that the number of grandparents raising their grandchildren has risen throughout the years. It's important that grandparents have access to the information, assistance, and resources they need in order to ensure the success of their grandchildren.

A few things that grandparents can do in order to contribute to the success of their grandchildren are to:



- Become familiar with the staff and administration at your grandchild's school. It's important that you become familiar with those at the school who are there to assist you. For instance, the parent liaison, teachers, principal, etc.
- Attend parent conferences at the school at least once each trimester. It's important to meet with your grand-child's teacher to discuss his/her progress. Often times, grandparents are unaware of how their grandchild is performing in school. In order to help your grandchild, you must be aware of his or her academic progress in order to determine his/her needs.
- Create incentives for your grandchild. It means the world to a child if they know they're going to get rewarded for doing a great job in school. Rewards don't have to be costly. You could create your very own treasure box for your grandchild using items from your dollar store. Whenever the child does well in school (i.e., passes a spelling test, receives a good behavior note from the teacher, etc.) allow him/her to choose a prize from the treasure box. Special prizes could also be their favorite snack.



- **Communicate with your grandchild daily.** It is important that your grandchild feels comfortable enough to share information with you. Converse daily with your grandchild. Ask them about their day in school and some of the things they did in school. This will allow you to be aware of any issues your grandchild may be having in school, if any.
- Check your grandchild's backpack at the end of each week, if not daily. Most times, students have information notices from the school that include important information for parents. These notices sometimes never make it in the hands of parents/grandparents because they're jammed at the bottom of the backpack. Checking your grandchild's backpack weekly will allow you to be informed of any events, meetings, or trainings occurring at the school.
- Help your grandchild with reading, homework, or special projects. Children enjoy having their parent assist them with homework, especially special projects. This will also provide you with the time to communicate with your grandchild while completing their assignments. It's like killing two birds with one stone.

believe every adult that is of significance in the life of a child has an integral role in the academic success of the child. According to Imtiaz, grandparents are a source of family history, teaching values, instilling ethnic heritage and passion on family traditions. Additionally, granddparents are natural nurturers. In my role as an administrator, I have observed students who have the social and emotional care needed to be successful, and those who might need more support in this area. Grandparents can be a great



benefit to a child's academic success by giving them the love and care they need socially and emotionally. Research supports the belief that "the whole child" must be educated to achieve true academic success. Yes, reading with them is important, but ensuring that Maslow's hierarchy of needs are met is a great start! This is an area where grandparents can be impactful!

Interestingly enough, my initial major upon attending the University of Florida was pharmaceutical sciences. Greetings, Raider Parents & Grandparents!

My name is Angela Moore. I am 48 years old and originally from Thibodaux, Louisiana. I have always wanted to be a teacher. Over 23 years ago, the late Dr. Effie C. Grear gave me the opportunity to teach at Glades Central Community High School, and four years ago, I became principal! I share that story because I want people to know that anything is possible with hard work and commitment.

Since I began my principal tenure, I have seen an enormous amount of support from our parents and grandparents. They attend parent meetings, parent/teacher conferences, extracurricular activities and more! I believe that this partnership of students + parents = success!

There are a few tips that I would like to share that contribute to the overall success of our students. These tips can be applied at any grade level:

• Get involved! You are important to us!

There is a misconception that parents are not involved if they are unable to physically visit the school. Parent involvement is asking questions about school when students get home. Encouraging your child to complete their homework. Seeking help for your child if you are unable to help them. Returning missed phone calls from the school. None of the things listed above requires you to physically come into the school. This can make the difference in your student's success or failure.

• **Regularly check your student's grades.** Glades Central Community High School prints progress reports every other week (bi-weekly). Parents/Grandparents can also access this information through Edline.  Celebrate small successes! We must encourage and motivate our students. They want to know that we care and that we are proud of them!

It is my goal to give students a different experience–an experience that they will remember for the rest of their lives. Education should be intentional and students should learn, but they should also have fun while learning.

I am most proud of returning to Glades Central as principal. I now have an opportunity to help shape the lives of my former students children and even more students. Every day, I am grateful for the opportunity to lead this school to greatness and serve this wonderful community. My students deserve my best!

Tith all of the changes happening today when it comes to education, whether it be online learning, rigorous standards, or diversifying the learning opportunities for students, it may seem hard for some parents, guardians, and grandparents to see how they can assist their child/ grandchild. Despite the ever-growing evolution of our education system, there are still some traditional and non-traditional ways that grandparents can be supportive.

- Socialization It is still important for young kids to be able to work with others and hold a conversation. These are skills employers are looking for. Make time in your day not only to ask your grandchild about their day, but to engage him/her in conversations to develop their socialization skills. This teaches them how to take turns, stay focused on a topic, and decide when certain language is/is not appropriate to use depending upon the setting and to whom they are speaking.
- **Reading** It is always a great idea to read to your grandchild. However, you should make it fun. Go to your local public library. Read at a park or in an area that is out of the ordinary but still not too noisy. When you read with a child, you help to model what good reading sounds like, support them with unfamiliar vocabulary, assist with clarify any misunderstandings, and you build a bond.
- Get involved I find that students who know their parents/

families actively participate at the school, maintain contact with teachers, and attend functions have a more positive outlook on school as a whole. Therefore, any relationship that you can build with the school (personnel) would be beneficial to your grandchild's learning.

I have been an administrator for nine years, all of which have been at of Rosenwald Elementary School. I was the assistant principal for four years, and then became the principal. As a child, I had a knack for explaining information to my peers, and I remember when one of my elementary teachers suggested this would make me a great teacher. However, I majored in Criminal Justice, but I found that many of my clients with high recidivism rates often did not complete high school. It was then that I returned to school to earn my education degree. I believe that education is the great equalizer, and regardless of where you come from, it puts everyone in a position to better themselves.

I am not sure what my greatest accomplishment has been as an educator, but I am always proud when I see that students have grown from where they started. It is even more inspiring when they see it in themselves. I often add quotes to my emails, but one that is a favorite of mine is by Oprah Winfrey, which is, "Education is the key to unlocking the world, a passport to freedom." When you see a student realize that they have learned something and then can apply it to something else, it gives me an overwhelming feeling of pride, because that knowledge cannot be taken away. It's been earned by them and is theirs to always have.

If nothing else, I want families to know that parents are their child's first teacher. This is not a saving that I created. but it is what I believe. From pre-school to college, it is important to be actively involved in your child's education. Ask questions (don't be afraid), visit, and remember, if vou make time in their daily routines to show that school is important, i.e., designated time and space for homework, coming to school prepared, etc., your children/grandchildren will think so, too.


