At the end of June, I became aware of horrific conditions at the Okeechobee Center, a rural housing complex in Belle Glade. In one heart-wrenching case, roaches were living in the ear of a young child and rodents were biting the children's toes at night. Mold covered the walls, causing respiratory issues. Numerous units throughout the complex are in similarly poor shape. These are some of the poorest

and hardest working residents in our county. No one deserves to live like this.

As County staff and community organizations jumped into action to help the residents, I immediately reached out to state and federal officials for assistance. On July 30, representatives from the United States Department of Agriculture, including State Director Phil Leary, came to the Glades to tour the property and meet with local officials to discuss a plan of action to get the necessary repairs and improvements made to the property as soon as possible. This story has made nationwide news. NBC News published an in-depth article detailing the poor conditions and historical background of the property, and discusses the systematic funding and oversight issues facing rural housing throughout the country. Our federal officials have recognized the magnitude of this issue as well. I want to thank Senator Rubio for his immediate action by including the below language in the FY 2020 Agriculture Appropriations bill that was favorably reported out of the Appropriations Committee with a 31-0 vote. Should this become law, it would be an important step to attaining increased funding and oversight for these rural properties.

Multi-Family Housing Health and Safety Concerns.—The Committee is concerned regarding sanitary and safety deficiencies in rental facilities participating in the Multi-Family Housing Program, such as those recently reported for Okeechobee Center in Belle Glade, Florida. The Committee believes such deficiencies are unacceptable and would be documented and remediated more promptly with improved inspections and coordination with state regulatory agencies. No later than 90 days after the date of enactment of this act, the Secretary shall submit a report to the Committee regarding the status and findings of all inspections within the last 5 years of properties that received financial assistance through the Multi-Family Housing Program.

I want to thank all of the local, state, and federal officials who have worked hard to address this disturbing case. It will take a continuing herculean effort to get this property in proper condition. For example, during recent inspections of the units, it was discovered that there were many missing fire detectors. Palm Beach County Fire Rescue immediately stepped up to install the detectors to address this public safety

The Okeechobee Center is not the only rural housing complex facing such conditions, so I will continue to use my voice as the Chair of the National Association of Counties Agriculture and Rural Affairs Steering Committee to advocate for measures that will address these long-standing deficiencies in our country's rural housing properties.



Hurricane Dorian

I am so grateful Palm Beach County was fortunate not to experience Hurricane Dorian's landfall, but our neighbors in the Bahamas suffered a storm so destructive, so frightening, so life-changing, that they will need our help for months, if not years, to come.

The way our county immediately jumped into action to help the Bahamas is a testament to our compassion. Over the September 7-8 weekend, Palm Beach County government held a Bahamas relief drive. County staff and volunteers led six donation sites at which 14 truckloads containing 120 pallets of supplies were collected. With our partners Tropical Shipping and Carnival Corporation, the supplies were promptly shipped to the Bahamas to help those in need. I want to thank all of the staff and volunteers who helped make this happen, as well as the

numerous other relief drives that were held throughout the county after the storm hit.

FAC Cleanup Effort in Panama City

On September 25, during the Florida Association of Counties Innovation and Policy Conference in Panama City, I joined county leaders across Florida to lend a hand for Hurricane Michael cleanup. Recovery is definitely moving along, but this area continues to need much help. Thank you to Rebuild Bay County and Catholic Charities USA for helping us clear residential properties impacted by this terrible storm.





El Paso Border Tour

I was recently appointed to the National Association of Counties Immigration Task Force and was invited by the Department of Homeland Security to tour the southern border station in El Paso, Texas with Customs & Border Patrol. During the 36-hour trip, I participated in briefings with staff from Homeland Security's Washington D.C. headquarters, as well as with Customs & Border Patrol agents at the Paso del Norte Port-of-Entry. These briefings were accompanied by tours of the border facilities. I was also able to walk across the border into Mexico, where our group was greeted by Mexican officials who escorted us to the Migrant Protection Protocol Refugee Center in Ciudad Juarez, Chihuahua.

This trip was an eye-opening experience. Our country's immigration laws are antiquated, our system of care for those that have been processed but remain in our care is woefully underfunded, and our national leaders in Congress must act now to pass meaningful, bi-partisan legislation.

New Yard Waste Guidelines

As a reminder, the new yard waste collection requirements went into effect on October 1. No more than 6 cubic yards will be serviced. Furthermore, each home

BCC Briefs

Some highlights of recent Board of County Commission actions:

Passports – approved an application by the Palm Beach County Main Library to the U.S. Department of State Passport Services to participate in the Passport Application Acceptance program. Designated library staff members will complete the online Passport Application Acceptance Training. The Library will require appointments from the public and will set the times that the service would be available. This initiative will be conducted as a one-year trial program. If the trial proves successful, the service will continue at the Main Library and the County will work with the U.S. Department of State to identify potential additional branches to host

Library fees – approved the elimination of overdue fines for library card members. Other changes to the library fee policy include raising the block limit of accrued fees

from \$5 to \$25. The policy changes took effect October 1.

Silverwood Estates – approved the contract for sale and purchase form for use in conjunction with the sale of six affordable/workforce housing units acquired by the county from Lennar Homes in the Silverwood Estates development.

Legislative Affairs – discussed and approved the proposed Palm Beach County legislative agenda for the 2020 Florida Legislative Session in Tallahassee. Many District 6 priorities were included.
